

All Hands on Deck: Volunteers, Donations Put "Community" in Community-Built

The town of Stanfordville just completed an all-volunteer rebuild of its iconic playground, SPARC Park. The original SPARC Park was built over 30 years ago as a community-led and -built project, and a group of community members organized the rebuild with the same community-led process. In 1991, when the playground was built, about 1,500 community builds a year took place. Today, that number is about 15. This 14,000-square-foot playground was designed with ideas by the children of the community and features upgraded safety surfacing, unique touches that pay homage to the history and small businesses of the community, as well as inclusive elements that make the park accessible to all.

What is most impressive was the fact that the park was built and funded by 300-plus community volunteers over an eight-day period. The community raised over \$500,000 to fund the materials and equipment costs, used loaned and donated tools, as well as materials (like screws, bolts, etc.) to complete the park from a number of local businesses. The total value of donated goods and services was upward of \$1.5 million with *no taxpayer funding*. The town received donations from both national and local businesses including The Home Depot Foundation, Stewart's Shops, Hannaford, Lowe's Home Improvement, and dozens others.


SPARC Park draws children and their families from neighboring towns such as Pine Plains, Millbrook, Milan, and Clinton Corners/Salt Point. A survey conducted in spring of 2023 found that most visitors of the park travel about five to 15 minutes, creating a travel radius that encompasses 30,000 to 40,000 Northern Dutchess County residents.

The newly built SPARC Park is extremely unique, and the community has received overwhelming positive feedback from the rebuild. The community not only built a

playground, but this playground built our community in the process.

"The support and encouragement that we've received from our community has been nothing short of remarkable. Our entire community has stepped up to help whether through a donation,

making signs for our volunteers, or turning wrenches to build this playground for our children. When the community builds the playground, the playground will build the community," Julia Descoteaux, General Coordinator, SSPPC, said.

\$60 MILLION IN GREEN
RESILIENCY GRANTS

Applications Due by August 16

President & CEO Maureen A.
Coleman announced that the
New York State Environmental
Facilities Corporation (NYSEFC) is
now accepting applications for the
inaugural round of the new Green
Resiliency Grant (GRG) program.

Gov. Kathy Hochul has made at least \$60 million available for green infrastructure projects such as green roofs, green streets, and permeable pavement. The new program will prioritize grants to flood-prone communities for projects that help protect New Yorkers from extreme weather events.

Applications and eligibility guidelines are available on EFC's website at www.efc.ny.gov/grg. Applications are due by 5 p.m. on August 16.

A competitive grant program, GRG may fund up to 90 percent of eligible project costs with a maximum grant of \$10 million.

Eligible projects must have a minimum total project cost of \$1 million and positively impact a minimum of 100,000 cubic feet of stormwater runoff annually. Eligible projects include those that address combined and/or sanitary sewer overflow during extreme weather events and those that combine green infrastructure and nature-based features to ensure infrastructure is climate resilient.

State Offers Cannabis Enforcement Webinars for Towns and Villages

In the FY 2025 State Budget, additional cannabis enforcement powers were created to address the proliferation of illicit cannabis shops statewide. The Office of Cannabis Management (OCM) will be conducting two virtual presentations for village and town leaders designed explain the new cannabis enforcement powers for counties and cities and ways town and village leaders can help tackle illicit cannabis shops that threaten the health and safety of New Yorkers.

SAFETY CORNER June is National PTSD Awareness Month

Mental health is an important component of our overall well-being and is as vital as the physical health of all employees. Mental health concerns due to work have the potential to adversely impact an employee's social interactions, productivity, performance, safety, and attendance. Workplace stress can be



created by the perception of having little control but many demands. Stress affects people in a variety of ways such as muscle tension, headaches, stomach discomfort, high blood pressure, and heart disease. Ignoring workplace stress can have lasting harmful effects on individuals, families, coworkers, and the communities municipal employees serve.

June is National PTSD Awareness Month, and while most of us view this as a risk to first responders, all workers have the potential to suffer from a traumatic event, carrying over feelings, emotions, and stress into other areas of our work and personal lives. Acute stress disorder and PTSD symptoms cannot be ignored in the workplace, so it's important to equip employees with the tools to handle crises. Consider informing staff about your Employee Assistance Program (EAP):

Early Mail Voter Act Constitutional, New York's Highest Court Finds

In 2023, New York adopted the New York Early Voter Mail Act, which allows all voters in New York to apply to vote early by mail in any election – including special town elections where personal registration is required – in which the voter is eligible to vote. The act went into effect Jan. 1, 2024 and led to at least 18,000 applications to vote early by mail, with ballots cast in two special elections, multiple village elections and a presidential primary (see *Stefanik v. Hochul*, 2024 NY Slip Op 24034).

In response to the enactment, various individuals and entities filed suit, asserting that the act violated the New York State Constitution by improperly expanding a group of voters eligible to vote without the required constitutional amendment, while the state and other defendants argued that the Legislature was authorized to provide for universal mail-in voting.

In issuing its opinion on May 9, 2024, the Court of Appeals noted that duly enacted statutes such as the act enjoy a "strong presumption of constitutionality" (see id., citing White v. Cuomo, 38 NY3d 209, 216 [2022]). In order to rebut this presumption, the plaintiffs had to demonstrate beyond a reasonable doubt that the act conflicted with the NYS Constitution. To this end, the court noted that it had long recognized the ability of the Legislature "to promulgate reasonable regulations for the conduct of elections" (see id., citing Matter of Davis v. Board of Elections of City of NY, 5 NY2d 66, 69 [1958]). Upon an analysis of the Constitution, the court found that there is no requirement mandating that voting must occur in person on Election Day. Taking that with the fact the Legislature has broad authority to legislate the manner in which voting occurs, the court held that the plaintiffs failed to demonstrate that the act was unconstitutional beyond a reasonable doubt. Accordingly, the Early Voter Mail Act may continue, and towns may encounter early voting by mail in special town elections that have opted in to personal registration. Elective Pay Program Informational Webinars

The NYS Governor's Office and US Treasury Department will be holding two informational webinars in early June to provide county and local government officials high level background about the Elective Pay program, a newly established federal program through which government entities can receive cash payments from the IRS partially reimbursing costs associated with certain clean energy and clean transportation projects. Examples of projects that may be eligible for these payments are EV purchases, EV charging infrastructure, and renewable energy projects including solar, geothermal, wind, and more. The purpose of the webinars is to raise awareness about the new program, provide a high level overview of how counties and localities can take advantage of it, and share resources local governments can turn to for more information.

DEADLINE EXTENDED

Proposed Changes to OSHA Fire Brigade Requirements Will Have Chilling Effect on Fire Providing Entities

Last month, we ran a call to action here regarding proposed changes to OSHA Fire Brigade Requirements. *The deadline to submit comments has been extended until July 21, 2024* and can be submitted here. Read on for a summary of the proposed changes and their possible effects.

In February 2024, OSHA proposed its rule to "modernize" protections for fire and emergency workers. The proposed rule addresses training and certification requirements, increased document and administrative burdens, and costly equipment, infrastructure and facility upgrades to fire providing entities. If enacted, these changes will further hamper the already-struggling recruitment and retention efforts of fire departments here. Assessor's Corner

Tax Bill Changes and the Judicial Security Act

The enactment of the 2024-2025 state budget brought about some changes pertinent to assessors. Specifically, new language is required on tax bills that should read substantially as follows:

"IF YOU ARE A SENIOR CITIZEN, A
PERSON WITH A PHYSICAL DISABILITY
AND / OR A VETERAN, YOU MAY BE
ENTITLED TO A PARTIAL EXEMPTION
FROM PROPERTY TAXES. Eligible
homeowners have until (insert
taxable status date) to apply for such
exemptions. For further information
please call or write the assessor's
office."

The assessor's address and telephone number must follow such notice. Note that this tax bill language is in addition to the second notice of exemption eligibility that must be mailed 30 days prior to the taxable status date.

Additionally, the final budget enacted the Judicial Security Act, which created a new article of the Judiciary Law to address security concerns with active and former judges and justices and their family members. Eligible individuals may file a written request to their current or former employer to keep personal information private, including, among other things, their address and other identifying information.

Employers are required to forward this written request to the public entity – among others – to notify them of the request to redact personal and private information. The public entity must remove personal identifying information within 72 hours of receipt of the request and make a reasonable effort to ensure that such personal information does not appear on any website maintained by the public entity. For assessors, this may entail removing the individual's name and identifying information from the assessment rolls. Note that the eligible individual must affirmatively request this removal.




